Headmaster's message to students



As in April, the intention of my half termly newsletter is to reflect with the student body on learning during lockdown. I have been so impressed by how extraordinarily well the vast majority of you have coped with the massive change to your educational

experience over the past two months.

Earlier this week, I received a lovely email from a student in Year 11 showing off her culinary as well as the gardening skills she has developed during lockdown. I am sure all of you have discovered, if you hadn't known it already, that there is as much if not more to learn outside of any school gate than within. As I quoted from Thomas L. Friedman's The World is Flat in a series of assemblies earlier this academic year:

"To learn how to learn, you have to love learning – because so much learning is about being motivated to teach yourself."

As a generation you have done it with social media and online gaming – are Maths and English really so much harder? On Bank Holiday Friday, I had a conversation with my niece, Rachel, in Ireland. She's 18 years old and was due to sit her Higher Leaving Certificate – the Irish equivalent of A Levels – this summer. Irish students had been promised final exams at some point this summer by an over confident Government. It was on our Bank Holiday Friday that they finally had to publically announce that they couldn't fulfil their promise. And so after two months of dedicated examination revision and preparation, Rachel and her peers were told that examinations would be cancelled and schools would submit grades along similar lines to how they are being calculated in the UK.

Many of her initial fears and concerns echoed the feedback I received from many of our own Year 11 and 13 students when they first heard the announcement made in Britain in early April. It gave me the opportunity to share with her my own reflections and try and provide some reassurance based on thirty years as a teacher and close on twenty years analysing examination grades at GCSE and A Level as a Senior Leader and Headmaster.

Her worries were many but after a while we agreed that in essence they boiled down to one particular "mock" exam where she felt she hadn't done as well as she could, the competitive nature of the university where she wants to study and whether or not the teachers at her school knew how hard she'd been working during the protracted period of lock down.

First off, your teachers know you far better than you think. We know your habits, your behaviours and just how seriously you take our subject and your learning. And what's more, they completely correlate with the results you achieve, year on year. As I have explained to students in Years 11 and 13 there will not be a single grade that I sign off that is solely based on any individual student's "mock" grade.

A teacher's professional judgement is always based on one overriding consideration about any given student – how reliable they are. Are you punctual, do you complete your work on time, do you give it your best shot, do you persevere when the work gets hard, are you proactive when it comes to improving your work? And these judgements are made "over time". One great piece of work doesn't prove anything just as one "failure" is never a condemnation.

Second, your teachers are always on your side and will give you the benefit of the doubt. Far from marking students down or seeking to penalise students, teachers are always looking to raise students' attainment not lower it. Teachers believe in every student's potential. It is your behaviours and habits that dictate whether or not your potential is fulfilled. There will always be special consideration for those with health, disability or Special Educational Needs to ensure that the school is as fair as it can possibly be to every individual student.

Third, genuine ambition is a lot rarer than you think. This is due to the fact that it is always allied to a strong work ethic which, for many, many people, is just "too much effort". Rachel was daunted by the fact that when she had attended her university's Open Day there were so many applicants and of course in her head she ranked herself far below these other people, who she had never met and never even spoken to. As I mentioned to her, it's one thing to turn up to a university Open Day and quite another to work hard with the sincere ambition to win your place there. Never be afraid of competition - for the genuinely ambitious always remember, the field is less wide than you think. Everything is possible and if you really want something (just as if you really want to learn something) you CAN do it. It's just down to you to supply the work ethic and not your teachers, parents or carers. And last, trust yourself and the efforts you make. You will get

what you deserve. These are unprecedented times and the future is extremely hard to predict. But whether you're awaiting final examination results or school calculated grades, if you can sincerely look in the mirror and tell yourself you have given it your best shot that should be good enough for each and every one of you. Your best is all any parent, carer and teacher can ever ask of you. And actually that goes for your true friends as well.

In conclusion, I want to remind each and every Parmiterian that the foundation of your success during your time at the school (and certainly in any final examination year) is always founded on those behaviours and habits you establish at the very start of Year 7 (and which many of you developed during your time in Primary school). Success does not come out of the blue and is never a fluke. Luck has nothing to do with it and neither does hope. We all want success and life on our terms but are we prepared to put in the shift?

Trust yourself – you're more special than you know.

The dilapidated buildings that stand before you are like nothing you had seen before. Sports Round Up


