As ever, Parmiter's families were amazing with their donations of new and nearly new board games and puzzles collected before Easter, which has enabled us to give lots of fantastic games, activities, board games and jigsaw puzzles for all age ranges to the Starfish Children's Ward at Watford General Hospital.
Their specialist playworkers, Shannon and Helen, were incredibly appreciative and let us know that they will be put to extremely good everyday use on both the ward and in their play/activity areas.
This initiative all came about from one of our brilliant student's ideas, when they met with the school Charity committee earlier in the year. They themselves have spent considerable time in hospital and wanted to make other's time there that little bit more enjoyable with family and friends. Parmiter's hope lots of children and young people will benefit from these new resources.

Despite the unpredictable nature of the UK's weather, the summer activities have started with promise and we are looking forward to a final half term of success.
Before you read about this term's activities, we are delighted to report on the success of the Under 13 girls' football team who was crowned Hertfordshire Schools Champions! In the final, the girls played Presdales, a tough and technical team from Ware. Our girls went a goal up, against the run of play, with Anna Anene scoring her 5oth goal of an outstanding season. Presdales then hit back, quickly scoring 2 goals to lead at half time. An inspired team talk from Ms Hall and Mr Beecher resulted in the girls being on fire in the second half. 2 more goals from Anna secured her hat-trick but also the County title. This is the first time, in over 20 years, the girls have been crowned
 Champions.


Despite it still being early in the cricket season, our teams have begun in earnest with some promising performances. At the time of writing, the Year 7 team is unbeaten in their first three matches. A brilliant 123 victory over Verulam in the Hertfordshire County Competition has been the standard. Vihaan Goyal and Rhiaan Patel have both amassed 50s, with Riyaan yet to go out in his three innings. The Year 8 team are the only ones to lose, with a defeat to Westbrook Hay School in the County Cup. The team never got going and, on a wet wicket, were not able to set enough runs to defend. The Year 9 team had a comfortable win over St Edmunds School to progress to round 2, where they will play Hemel School. For the first time, we entered our Senior team into the National Tzo Competition, a prestigious competition that pitches the best cricketing schools against each other. We played Haberdashers Boys School, losing on the very last ball. Having set 132-2 from our 20 overs, with captain Anay Maheshwari scoring an unbeaten $69^{*}$ and Year 10 student Nakul $39^{*}$. We were always hopeful of taking the game deep. Into the last over, Habs needed 6 runs to win with 2 wickets left. Nakul removed one of the wickets, leaving Habs teetering on the edge of defeat. Despite a huge LBW appeal, Habs scampered a single off the last ball to win by 1 wicket. It was an incredible performance from such a young team.

Our tennis teams have hit the ground running with some excellent performances so far. The Under 15 girls set the standard with a fine 12-o victory over Berkhamsted. The Under 13 girls matched them with an equally impressive 10-2 win over Watford Girls. In the District League, the Year 7 and 8 boys' team both beat St Joan of Arc 8-0, with the Year 10 girls' and boys' teams inflicting the same defeat on St Margarets.

At the halfway point of the athletics season, all of our teams are in a strong position to qualify for the County finals in July. There have been some impressive performances, with all teams picking up big points in the County League events. Special mention to Year 8, Anna Anene, who broke the school record for her 1oom running a time of 12.7. Anna now owns the Year 7 and 8 record, as well as the Year 8 triple jump honour. In the English Schools Track and Field Championships, we hope to hear shortly on our teams qualification for the regional round. The U14 girls and U16 boys were beat placed, scoring nationally recognised points. We hope to be able to update you, in the last InForm of the year, on end of season successes.
