On Monday evening I had the privilege of attending our annual Sports Awards Evening. There was so much to celebrate as new records were set, once again, for the number of competitions where we have claimed trophies, cups and medals. Victory aside, what has been just as gratifying has been seeing the huge participation rates among our student body across the various summer sporting activities this half term. A particular highlight, as ever, was our annual Sports Day at Woodside and congratulations to Carter House who lifted the Sharples Cup for the second year running.

Summer Open Day and Celebrating Creativity

Celebrating Creativity was the centre piece of our summer Open Day, which provided prospective parents, carers and children with the chance to see the school in the daylight and have a proper look at what our amazing students and exceptional staff accomplish over the course of an academic year. Our Musicians have just returned from a tour to Aachen which included performances in Belgium, Holland and Germany. Year 7 students had the chance to sample French culture in Normandy and put their language learning this year to good use. Whilst Year 9 students visited Belgium and the World War One battlefields to deepen their understanding of the historical background and tragic nature of the conflict. Congratulations to our successful Years 10, 11, 12 and 13 students who completed their Bronze, Silver and Gold Duke of Edinburgh expeditions. A special mention to those Sixth Form Parmiterians who were invited to Buckingham Palace in recognition of their Gold Awards.

And whilst we were busy with all the above, we finally had our Ofsted inspection – the first since 2011. Unfortunately, we will have to wait until September for the final, written report, but the provisional outcome and the verbal feedback the school leadership team and governing body received was extremely gratifying. Their judgement was that Parmiter's is an exceptional school with a curriculum offer and extra-curricular opportunities that far exceed those found in other schools. Students' behaviour and attitudes are exemplary. Nothing we didn't already know but it's always pleasing to have this endorsed by the 'Powers that Be'. Most pleasing for me was the staggering approval ratings from the Ofsted parents & carer, student body and staff surveys.

Junior Speech Night

On Tuesday night we had our final formal event of the year, hosting our Junior Speech Night, where our guest was my illustrious predecessor, Mr Daymond. It was wonderful to celebrate the many achievements of our student body across Years 7, 8 and 9. Despite the torrid weather, this summer has been nothing short of warm and sunny in terms of success! Incredible commitment from our athletes to training and competition has been rewarded with remarkable results and success all round, including winning County titles in Athletics, Cricket and Tennis!

County League Athletics

Our summer athletics season begins with 6 County league events, competing against 5 schools during each meet. The points accrued during these events dictate whether you qualify for one of the finals, either the main final for those finishing in position 1- 4 or the plate final for places 5-8. It was extremely exciting to see our U14 girls, U16 girls and U16 boys all finish within the top 4 and qualify for the main final. Our U14 boys finished in 6th place and were rewarded with a plate place.

Whilst so many of our athletes competed incredibly well, special mentions must be given to the following athletes Anna Anene (U14 girls) for unrivalled success in the 100m sprint, Triple Jump and relay. Year 7s Dina Bozorgi and Gabi Olusanya-Artiles were also invaluable to the team with excellent performances in the Long Jump and 1500m respectively.

In the U14 boys' team, it was Alex Gow who was the standout performer, remaining unbeaten across 12 events in Long Jump, 200m and hurdles. Year 7 student, Jonah McNaught (pictured right) also ran exceptionally well in the 800m race.

The U16 boys' team had several top performers, none more so than Ramsey Gill in the Pole Vault, clearing 3.40m on his way to selection for Hertfordshire in the English Schools Championships, and Hayden Stapelberg who won several Javelin events. Alongside them, saw Luca Lazar, Peter Bansaghi, Charlie Henson, Jake Rayner and Keelan Skehill-White secure regular success in their own events. The U16 girls' team had consistent performers throughout with Hu Xin Sezille, Jessica Street and Autumn Rana being the most regular winners in their events.

The finals came with all four teams competing to the very best of their abilities. The U14 boys left nothing on the track to finish in 2nd place. The U16 girls finished 6th in the main final, followed by the U16 boys in 3rd position. The most remarkable result came from our U14 girls who were crowned Hertfordshire County Champions by 4 points, ahead of Berkhamsted and Queenswood School. This is an incredible achievement and one which will live long in the history of our school.







Watford District Championships

The annual Watford District Championships was another opportunity for our students to showcase their talents. We had 19 winners, all proudly being awarded the title of Watford Schools Champion.

Hertfordshire Championships

In the Hertfordshire Individual Championships, we had 21 students compete with 5 of them being crowned County Champions:

Congratulations to Hayden Stapelberg, Ramsey Gill (pictured right) and Jaquim Veneracion who all represented Hertfordshire in the South England Combined Events Championships. The 5 event programme saw the boys make up ¾ of the Herts team competing against all other Southern Counties. 7 PBs across the boys events helped Hertfordshire to a second place finish behind Kent. The boys will now go on to represent Hertfordshire at the National Championships in September. At the time of writing, Ramsey is currently in Birmingham, representing Hertfordshire at the English Schools Athletics Championships and will be competing in Pole Vault, hoping to better his 3m 40cm Personal Best.




National Track and Field Cup

All four of our teams qualified from the County round through to the regional finals. Our U16 girls managed to qualify for the Final and performed incredibly well to win the event. Our U14 girls and U16 boys both performed against the best schools in the Southern Regional in the A final, surpassing their team score from round 1. The girls were exceptional throughout, finishing in 2nd place, only a few points behind the winners and narrowly missing out on a place in the National final. Our U16 boys also outperformed themselves, finishing in a very credible 4th place.

Tennis

It isn't only athletics success that I can report at County level. Huge congratulations to both our U13 and U15 girls' Tennis teams who were both crowned Hertfordshire Champions.

Our U13 team very nearly did the County double of winning the Nicola Mabbit Cup and the County League. The girls competed in Division 2 of the Hertfordshire league. The competition begins as a group stage with the winners of each of the four groups qualifying for the finals day. Wins against Watford Grammar, Queenswood and Tring left the girls unbeaten and rewarded them with a place on finals day. It was a match vs St Albans School and, despite a tricky start, they were able to record a win and play Ashlyns for in the final. Ashlyns were exceptional with two nationally recognised players in their team. Despite giving everything, the girls had to settle for second



place. However, in the Nicola Mabbit trophy, the girls went one better, winning the title. In the District stage, they won all 6 matches earning the right to represent Watford against the other District winners. On finals day, all 3 teams won 2 sets and lost 2 sets but because of our better games difference, we qualified for the final. We played Presdales who had won the other group and soundly beat them 4 sets to 0 to become County Champions.

The U15 tennis teams have had a superb run this year in both County and District Leagues. In the District League we played six matches and won 4. We didn't quite do enough to qualify for the County Finals but some thoroughly enjoyable matches were played. In the County Tennis League division 2, with the help of Michaela Yeung as our number 1, and Kitty Harrington-Smith from Year 9, Teodora Randall, Jodie Chan and Trinetra Garge won all their pool matches to qualify for the semi finals at Queenswood School. The last pool match was a nail biting shootout at 3 sets all against Beaumont, which we won 10-8.

In the semi final we played Dame Alice Owen's and convincingly beat them, to qualify for the final against St Albans High School. A quick win for Michaela put us one set up, and then 3 close sets followed. Teodora was the last player to finish, turning a 4-1 game down to a 6-4 victory. This sealed the win and we finished as County Champions for the first time.

Hui Xin has been busy, travelling across Europe and Britain to compete in many high level fencing competitions. We are delighted to announce that Hui Xin is now the British U17 Champion, following her victory at the British Championships, last month. In the European rankings, she is currently ranked 4th in Euro and this was vindicated in the recent European competition in Barcelona. Hui Xin fenced her way to 3rd place as an individual and contributed to the Great Britain team winning the gold medal and being ranked in 1st place. Well done, we are so proud of you!
